

Fernando Gets Ripped, 34-19

Slater Leads Vike Scorers as Tame Tigers, 32-6

Scoring two touchdowns himself and passing for another, Bob Slater led the Monroe Viking Varsity Football team to a 32-6 victory over the San Fernando Tigers, at Tiger Stadium, Friday evening.

Once again the Vikings outclassed their rivals by employing a clock-eating and hard crushing ground attack. Quarterbacks Russ Johnson was like the general leading his troops in battle, constantly pushing forward leaving nothing behind but devastation.

The win over the Tigers was the fourth in a row for the Vikes and their first league decision.

Monroe's defense was once again unscored upon. According to Coach Raymond, the Tigers touchdown came when relief quarterback Don Kuhnhoff called for a pitch to the fullback who got his signals crossed and ran the wrong way. Then with the ball lying inside the Monroe 20 yard line a Tiger defender bobbled it to another and he ran it in for the score.

One touchdown for the Vikings came when Johnson handed off to Slater with a pass-run option. Slater then choose to throw to Dale Walker in the end zone for the score.

The first and last touchdowns for Monroe came from Tom Perkins.

A strong running game, combined with superlative defensive performances, powered Monroe's Varsity Football team to their fourth consecutive win without a loss, as they overpowered the San Fernando Tigers, 34-19.

The Vikes, who has been dependent on the passing ability of Benjamin throughout their first three games, reverted to an exciting running attack which featured Fernando Nunez.

Nunez gained 133 yards in 33 carries for a 4.0 average, and scored two touchdowns.

The game itself, which was a must win for the Vikes, was once

again highlighted by a shimmering defensive unit, spearheaded by Co-Captain Dennis Shaw.

The Viking defense silenced the Tigers; running attack, allowing only a meager 6 yards.

San Fernando, led by quarterback Daryl Briggs, never fully recovered after the Vikings jumped out to a 21-0 lead before the half, but showed their ability as they startled the Vikings with a pair of touchdowns inside of the final two minutes.

The Vikes set up their first score of the game after Briggs drilled a pass to Viking defensive back Jim Sharp for his first

of three interceptions.

Eight plays later the Vikes were on the scoreboard when Benjamin scored from 2 yards out.

Brad Rice's second PAT attempt was good and gave the Vikes an early 7-0 lead.

Squeaky Bill Barto set up the Vikes second touchdown for the evening as he returned a short punt to the San Fernando 13.

Two plays later Benjamin connected with Rice, who also booted his second PAT, and suddenly were sitting on an early first quarter 14-0 lead.

Linebacker Shaw put the Vikes within reach of their third score after he recovered a fumble on the San Fernando 44.

Now working from the Tigers 23 yard line and on fourth down, Benjamin was aided by the San Fernando defensive line as they drew an offsides penalty and the Vikes had their first and ten at the Tigers 18.

Benjamin then gave to Nunez who got as far as the 1, a gain of 17.

After a loss of a yard by Mitch Drootin, Nunez marched in for the first of his two touchdowns.

Down 21-0 the Tigers suddenly came to life as Briggs threw to his favorite receiver, sophomore James Sarpy, for a 39-yard score.

On the final play of the first half Briggs again connected with Sarpy, this a 16 yard touchdown and the Tigers were once again in the ball game as they trailed 21-13.

The third quarter went scoreless, but the Vikes again went to work on the Tigers defense as they added a pair of touchdowns.

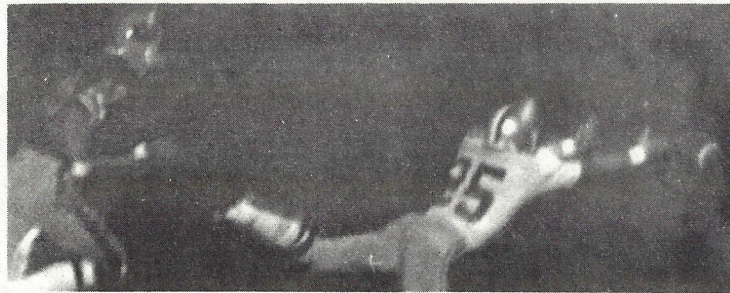

Student Suggests Reforming VAC

Therefore, I propose another activity card, to be modeled after the VAC, for the performing arts. The card would cover admission to all play production, dance band, orchestra, vocal ensemble, choir, and modern dance performances, (with the exception of the annual musical, which is a fund raiser). Besides pre-funding these departments and totaling less money for students than if each event were paid for individually, such a card would probably increase attendance at some of the traditionally less popular types of performances, as the VAC does for certain sports.

Counselors Available Between Class Periods

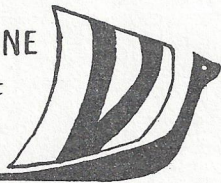
Students and teachers will now be able to speak with counselors at times other than class periods, according to Head Counselor Charles Scott.

'Omega Man' Gory But Good

Charlton Heston has undertaken his third attempt at science fiction in "Omega Man." Although not of the caliber of "Planet of the Apes," "Omega Man" is a realistic and often frightening movie.

The story's realism is probably due to the fact that it deals with something that could

possibly happen. It tells of the world of 1977, destroyed and almost cleared of normal human life by germ warfare.

As the hero, Heston plays the part of a lonely but brave military doctor who believes he is the only living human left. Anthony Zerbe turns in an excellent performance as the leader of the maimed victims of the war who are intent on destroying all vestiges of the technology which ruined them. Rosalind Cash does a good job as the tough temptress who is Heston's downfall.

Makeup works the real magic in the film. The faces of Anthony Zerbe and his "family" are horrifyingly realistic and grotesque. The effect the appearance of these characters has on the story is greater than any other factor.

At times, the movie seems to have an excess of blood and gore. The picture's preoccupation with showing the corpses of the war victims considerably detracts from the overall quality of the "Omega Man."

As a whole, "Omega Man" offers good entertainment for the science fiction enthusiast who has tired of space ships and little green martians.
