## Will Van Nuys Be Sixth Victim?

Can Monroe's Varsity football machine make the Van Nuys Wolves their sixth victims?

All the signs seem to point that way.

After torturing the Birmingham Braves 27-7 last week, the Vikes will put their perfect 5-0 record on the line tomorrow night when they travel to Van Nuys.

But they won't have much to be bothered about.

The Wolves, who were tabbed by many to the Valley's top team this season, have done a complete about-face as they still are looking for their first victory with an 0-5 record.

The San Fernando Tigers were the latest to trump the Wolves as they downed them 27-9 last Friday.

Van Nuys does have experience at the quarterback position however with junior Bob Ochoa, who saw considerable action last year after replacing the injured Sandy Dorando.

Offensively the Wolves have been led by running back Frank Giordano and wide receiver Rich Schussel.

Giordano has chalked up 355 yards on 67 carries, a 5.3 average, while Schussel has snared 15 passes for 257 yards.

It seems the Wolves have tried all but the kitchen sink to pull themselves together this year, using everything from the Wishbone T to the "Lonesome Polecat" (center-eligible) offensive formations.

The Viking Bee team, who have administered four whitewashings in five games, are also heavy favorites to defeat the Wolfpups.

Scoring 284 points in five games, while allowing just 6, the Vikes can again expect solid performances by Bob Slater, Tom Perkins, Russ Johnson, and the amazing Bee defense.

Last year the Bees tied the Wolfpups for first place in the M.V.L. They were edged by the Wolves 14-12 last year so they are sure to put on a super show with their exciting and explosive offense.

## Board of Education Revises Student Censorship Rules

Local school districts have been told by the State Board of Education "to encourage students to express opinions, to take stands, to support causes, and generally exercise their constitutional rights of free expression on campuses," according to an article published October 16 in the Los Angeles Times.

The Times' story said that, under the new directive, students have the right to distribute literature, including petitions, newspaper, circulars and leaflets, on campus before and after school and during lunch

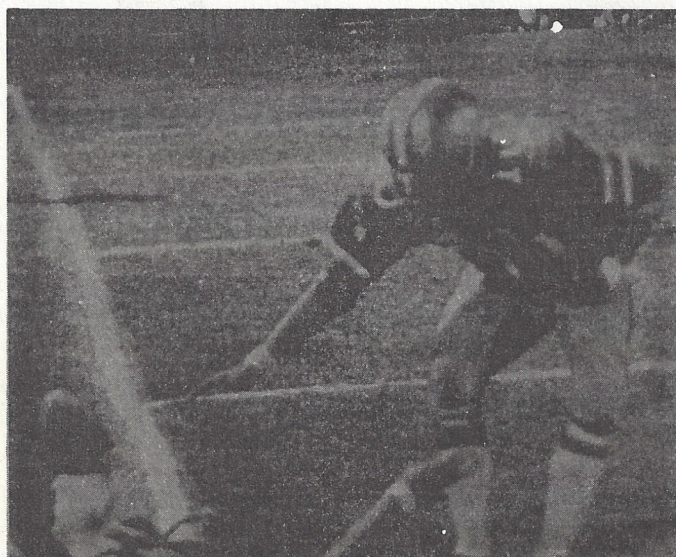
periods, but should be prohibited from circulating "material which is obscene or libelous, which might incite students to unlawful acts, or material which advocates racial, ethnic or religious prejudices.

Principal E. A. Miller said Tuesday, however, that former guidelines will continue to be followed until the Los Angeles Board of Education issues a detailed revision of board policy to school principals.

Mr. Miller did speculate, however, that the order would probably have no effect on present codes regarding the uses of classrooms by student groups; in order for students to be allowed the use of a room for meetings, he said, state law requires that an adult sponsor be present at all times.

Mr. Bernard Feuerman, Doctrine advisor, said Tuesday that the new guidelines would have little

effect on Doctrine policies, since the newly issued guidelines merely reaffirm what is current Doctrine policy. "As I see it" Mr. Feuerman stated, this decision just recognizes what many enlightened schools are already doing. The idea of a high school press, censored to a public relations sheet for the school administration, was discarded at Monroe several years ago."


