

Quad Plan Approved, Phase Two To Begin

A plan for the delayed quad improvement project, a project to get rid of the mud on campus and improve campus lawn condition, was approved last week by Student Council and work on phase two begin during Christmas vacation.

Phase two, as is now proposed, entails leaving over half of the lawn in front of F-hall as grass and the remainder will be concrete except for the addition of two planters. A continuous bench will be placed around three sides of the lawn are to route excess traffic around the grass to protect it.

Phase two of the project was delayed last year when students complained that the old plan, which was approved two years ago, involved too much concrete. The old proposal was to concrete the complete lawn and add several planters.

Money for the project was raised with part of last year's candy drive and surplus money from phase one. The proposal will now be presented to a landscape architect and final plans will be drawn up.

In other action, the council approved a motion by Nancy Nishioka to end the dances after the football games at midnight instead of 11:30.

Student Council has formed a special committee to develop a

United Crusade Contribution Could Be Profitable Investment

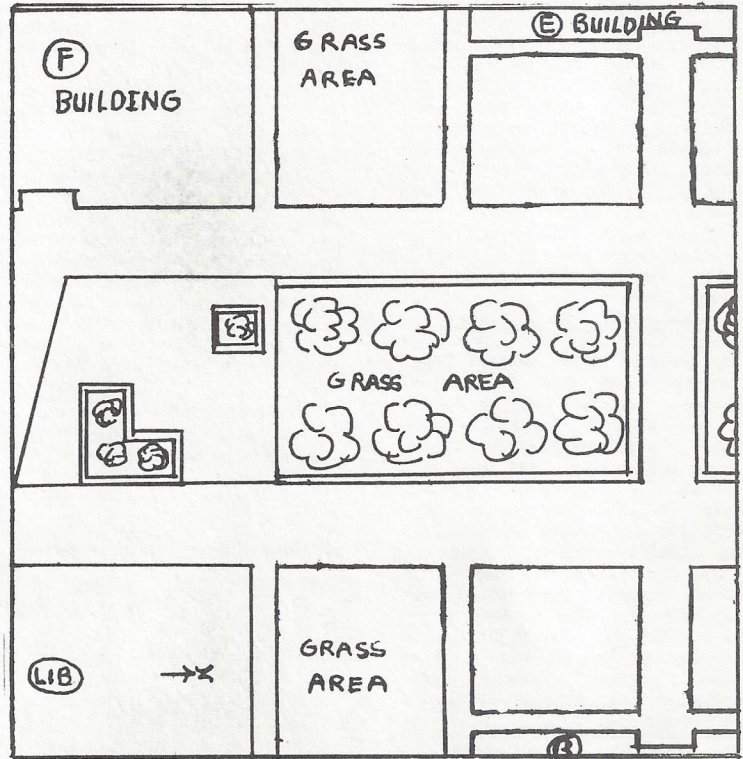

Bees Demolish Wolves

Once again the amazing Bees appeared victorious, stunning the Van Nuys Wolves, 30-6, giving them their sixth consecutive trouncing without a loss this season.

After taking the Viking's kick off, the Wolves had a first and ten situation on their own 34 yard line. On the sweep, the ball was fumbled and recovered by Monroe, giving the Vikings excellent field position on the Van 33 yard line.

On the snap to Johnson, he apparently just couldn't hold on to the ball in the torturous cold, fumbling, and consequently the Wolves recovered back at their own 34. The Vikings held on the four sets, friving the Wolves back and taking possession but it wasn't for long as for they fumbled the skin again, giving it to the Wolves who were

set up for the touchdown, which was a 35 yard bomb.

Quarterback Russ Johnson had perhaps his best passing game this season completing seven of eleven passes for approximately 100 yards, averaging approximately 14 yards perpass.

The Wolves offense and defensive teams lived for their expectations with a fine running ofense, who were complimented by their terrific linemen who contained the Viking rush.

Van Nuys was also able to get a successui passing attack into action, to dazzle the Viking backs, scoring once on the second string defense.

As usual, running backs, Tom Perkins, plagued by a broken nose, and Bob Slater had outstanding evenings against the Wolves defense, making ready for the game Friday against Poly.

Transcripts Show 750

Graduates in College

750 (62.5%) of the 1198 seniors in last June's graduating class are presumably now enrolled in college, according to a tally of final transcripts mailed.

43.2% of the class are enrolled in Junior Colleges. 114 students (9.5%) are now attending classes at San Fernando Valley State. UCLA is hosting 28 June graduates, and 21 students are now attending other four year colleges in California. Also, 28 former seniors (2.3%) are enrolled in four year colleges outside of California. In total, 232 (19.2%) of the June graduates are now enrolled in four year colleges and universities.

Seen Largest in District

Monroe High is now considered to be the largest in its district with a total enrollment of 4,927, according to figures released by John A. Gilleen, Director of the Los Angeles City Schools Public Information Office.

Total enrollment in Los Angeles City Schools is down 1.8 per cent from last year, according to these figures. According to School Superintendent William Johnston, the decline in enrollment in the San Fernando Valley appears to have been caused by families leaving the Valley because of the increasing layoffs of aerospace workers here.

Communitistic Thoughts Suggested By Schools

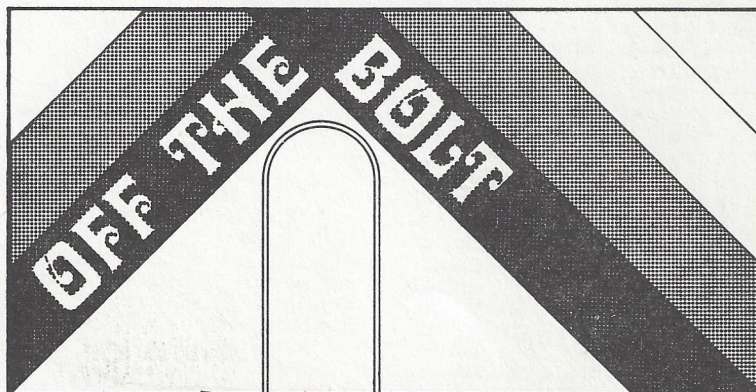
