Tomorrow afternoon Coaches Ken McKenna and Harry Frum will administer a test to their 1971 Varsity football team. The test? The Chatsworth Chancellors!

The Vikes will meet head-on with the powerful West League runner-ups in round one of this year's City playoff tournament tomorrow at Birmingham with kickoff scheduled for 1:30.

The Chancellors earned their playoff berth last Monday when they proved that last week's 9-0 win over Canoga Park was no fluke, coming right back to defeat the Hunters a second time, 6-0, in a special WVL tie breaking contest.

Unlike last week's 9-0 win over Granada Hills, McKenna predicts a strong offensive game

between both squads and figures to see a number of touchdowns in the game against the team he and Frum describe as "the best we've played yet."

How many points for an "A" on the test? "At least four touchdowns and maybe more," according to Frum.

CHESS-CHATTER

Chessmen Conduct Private Wars in Not - So - Dull Game

Each day at noon, about 16 unassuming individuals gather in E-12 and calmly beat, bully and punish each other until the end of the period.

The gaudy group is the Monroe Chess Club. Daily they meet and challenge each other and, with a small checkered board and a few carved figures between he and his opponent, each player becomes a general, fantasizing images of himself as Napoleon, MacArthur or Churchill.

Occasionally from amidst the roomful of hunched shoulders comes a jubilant cry of "checkmate!" followed by a tepid "I shall return" from the clobbered commander. But typically the room is quiet during one of these meetings. "Such sports as football or boxing may, to the ignorant spectator, seem slightly more exciting than chess," said one club member. "But these sports often cause great physical pain. The only injuries in chess come from 1) rages of insanity and 2) thrown chess pieces."

Chess, although not considered a major sport in the United States, often draws thousands of spectators to important matches in other countries. Grandmaster level games in these countries are held in elegant halls and theatres. By contrast, the U.S. Open Chess Championship which drew 400 players from around the world, was held recently in a large aluminum barn-type building at the rodeo grounds in Oxnard.

Nevertheless, despite chess' low popularity here, the Monroe players are indeed a spirited lot. Some members have even expressed a desire to bring cheerleaders to important games to boost morale... "Hit 'em high! Hit 'em low! Take his queen! Go! Go! Go!"

all-league halfback Greg Lane (5-11, 175) who has gained 690 yards on 152 carries, a 4.5 average.

Along with Lane will be tailback Bob Mitchell (5-9, 155) who also doubles as defensive safety. Mitchell starred in last Friday's victory over Canoga Park scoring the Chancellor's lone touchdown, a thrilling 65-yard return of an intercepted pass.

Further headaches for the Vikings will be the Chancellors offensive line, which carries an abundance of pounds.

The solids are snarl Steve Olsen (6-0, 185), center Jerry Freed (6-3, 185), and tackles Dennis Sherlock (6-0, 235), and Bob Stewart (6-6, 250).

Directing traffic for the Chatsworth squad will be quarterback Greg Petticord, (5-8, 150) a junior up from last year's Bee squad, who's passing record of 29 of 98 has yielded 496 yards.

A strong running game by Chatsworth is certain and with solid performances by Lane, Mitchell and Petticord, the Chancellors could find themselves out on top.

On the other hand, a Viking offensive explosion will surely punch holes in the Chatsworth bandwagon. The Guy Benjamin to Steve Bergman pass-receiver combination could prove fatal to the Chancellors if the Vikes are able to start off on the right foot. And with a repeat performance of last week by halfback Fernando Nunez, the Vikings could well find themselves in the driver's seat, headed for round two next week.

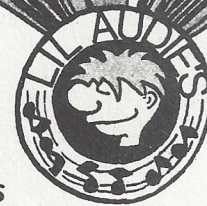
