

# Will Smell Of Roses Spoil Gridders?

If Stanford and Michigan can go then why not Monroe?

A fresh smell of roses, the 100,000 plus crowd and the nationwide TV audience will be absent but the excitement and the glory will still be there as Monroe's Varsity football squad journeys to the glorious garden gridiron of Pasadena tomorrow, not as Pac-8 or Big Ten conference champs, but as the 1971 MVL champions, in to do battle with the Eastern League champion Bell Eagles.

The game, second of a twin bill, is the semi-final contest in this year's city playoff tournament with the winners to meet next week for the 1971 City Championship against the victors of the Carson Colts vs. the Cleveland Cavaliers showdown which will kickoff at 12:00. The Monroe-Bell match will begin

immediately following game No.1 at approximately 2:30.

Bell, which boasts a perfect 10-0 record, should provide a wide variety of excitement both offensively and defensively as they possess an array of pound-pushing linemen and have the distinction of winning in the closing seconds.

The Eagles' defensive rush, rated as tops in the city, will come with a bevy of six footers

in hopes of shattering the Viking offensive line and silencing the Monroe ground attack.

In last week's speaker against Banning, the Bell bombers sacked quarterback Vince Ferragamo for over 50 yards and completely smothered the Pilots' running game to a minus 1-yard.

Tomorrow, they'll have their sights set on Viking quarterback Guy Benjamin who, earlier this season, proved to be a line-hacker's delight as he easily

became the most catchable Viking of the year.

But the 6-4 junior quarterback has different ideas about tomorrow saying that with another strong offensive line, "there's no way we can't pick 'em apart," and added that he has "learned to throw the ball away instead

of suffering a deep loss. If I have enough time to throw, I know we can beat them."

Coach Ken McKenna, who is "thrilled to death to be here, even as underdogs," has said that Benjamin will have to "roll out and throw quick" if the Vikes are to emerge successful. "We'll have to keep their physical people off of us." He said that the "key" will be the offensive line which McKenna lists as "super."

The immense size of the Eagles line will be highlighted by tackles Robert Wolf (5-10, 225), Big John Peters (6-6½, 280), center Tom Ogle (5-10, 200), and guard Ray Dabela (6-3, 195), all of whom are juniors.

A variety of two-way performers for Bell will include tackle Eugene Lawryk (6-3, 210), all league linebacker-split end Gary Turner (6-5, 190), split end-free safety Gabriel Hearne (6-2, 175), and slotback-linebacker Andy Zepeda, (6-1, 190).

The offensive backs will be headed by quarterback Keith Mintun (6-3, 190) who will be accompanied by halfback Lamont Montgomery (5-10, 170), and fullback Gil Robinson (6-0, 190).

Although the Vikes crept by Fremont 15-13 last week it proved to be an expensive victory with the result of injuries to three squad members.

Defensive back Jim Sharp suffered a broken right ankle and will be lost for the season, while running back Fernando Nunez and defensive back Bill Barto are listed as "doubtful" by McKenna. Nunez is recovering from a bruised thigh as a result of an injury earlier last week while Barto is nursing strained shoulder ligaments.

## Effectiveness Probed
