Viking pitcher Russ Johnson, picked up his second loss of the season, while allowing only two earned runs.

Thursday the visiting Monroe Vikings met the Verdugo Dons in their third league meet of the season. Monroe was defeated by the Dons, 79.5-46.5.

The Vikes, although defeated, showed excellent scores and ability. In the tumbling event Verdugo placed first and second while Monroe took third by Cathy Coghlan with the score of 5.8.

Monroe placed first on the parallel bars by Linda Kertesz who has consistently been obtaining high scores.

The floor exercise saw both first and second taken by Verdugo. Cathy Coghlan, all-round contestant held a high score of 6.6, and finished third.

Debbie Price, an excellent and promising athlete, took first on beam with the score of 6.3. Reiko Shiraiash, another Monroe contestant on the beam, has gained one point more each meet.

All-round athlete Cathy Coghlan is still yet to be defeated since her beginning in gymnastics in 1971. Cathy came in first on the all-round against the Dons with a score of 24.40.

Although the Don's have never been defeated in the past three years, Monroe proved to be stiff competition and did show strength.

The Vikes' next meet will be against the Poly Parrots on April 18 at Poly.

The Los Angeles City School District encompasses 710.01 square miles compared to the city of Los Angeles which consists of 463.68 square miles.

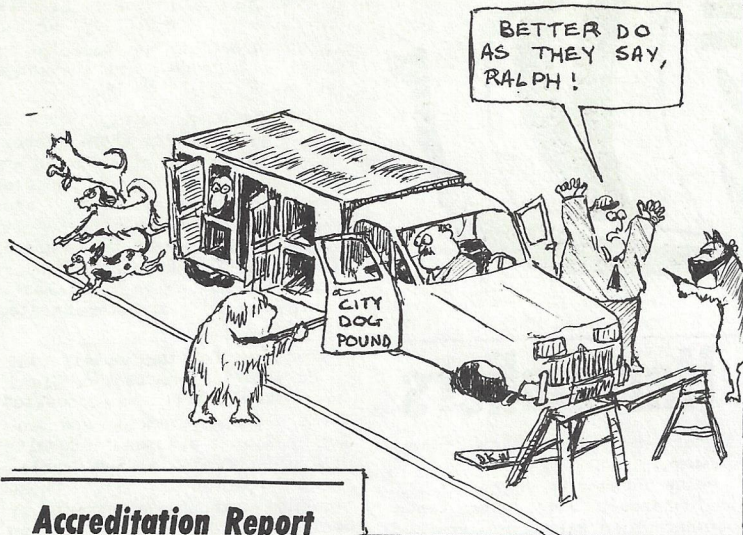
Students Replace 25 Trees

Under the supervision of Mr. Jack Yost, landscaping teacher and sponsor of Monroe's vocational Department, 25 students have helped to add beauty to parkways along a half mile strip on Chatsworth Street between Wilbur and Tampa Avenues in Northridge.

The students spent a full day replacing 25 trees that were destroyed by the 1971 earthquake and Valley windstorms and repairing others that were damaged. Students returned the following week to water and inspect each tree and are planning to make regular trips to the site to check on condition and growth of the trees.

Following the day of planting and repairing, participants visited every house in the immediate area to inform people of what they had done and ask permission for temporary use of garden hoses and water to maintain the plants.

Monroe will enter the community project in the forthcoming annual school agricultural awards competition sponsored by Los Angeles Beautiful Inc.



Accreditation Report

The recommendation that "a continuing effort be made to further increase the work experience program" has been effected as the enrollment in Work Experience has increased rapidly over the past eight years.

The library staff has been working on the Accreditation team's suggestion "that ways be found to involve more students in the selection and evaluation of library materials." Monthly requests for suggestions for books to order are being sent to each department chairman and a suggestion box has been set in the library for this purpose.

Other areas where progress is being made in the Accreditation recommendations is in the establishment of department Resource Centers, satellite book rooms in each field of study, new elective offerings, Health Education evaluation and Music enrichment plans.
