Gillinger Protests Judging

A protest has been launched by Mrs. Donna Gillinger to the Board of High School Sports concerning the judging of Girls Gymnastic events.

Complaint

Mrs. Gillinger's complaint is that judges at some high schools score lower or higher than others, thus causing the girls averages to vary not according to whether they win or lose, but the schools most of their events take place at.

Only the best five in each event go to the city competition but with the present scoring system the five going aren't necessarily the best five, Mrs. Gillinger said. For example, in vaulting, North Hollywood has three of the best, Poly one and Monroe one, but as of now only one of North Hollywood's will go and the other four are uncertain.

A girl could win every meet but not make it to City if the judges where she competes score low (2 or 3) for a good showing instead of a (6 or 7).

Mrs. Gillinger stated that she would like to see girls all get as many points for first place and so many for second, third and fourth.

Annual AFS Carnival Hosts Many Attractions

Soul food, cakes, apple cider, gambling and bagles are just a few of the attractions that will be offered at Monroe High's annual American Field Service Carnival of Friday, May 12 in the boy's gym.

Many service clubs and student organizations have organized different booths for the purpose of raising money for sending AFS finalists Kerry Silvey and Mike Spore to a foreign country as part of their high school education. Proceeds will also go to support any foreign exchange student who might attend Monroe next year.

Each group will design and build their own booth. Prizes and a trophy will be awarded for distinctive booths.

A few of the booths will be a "soul food" booth, serving chitlins, pigs knuckles, barbecued spare ribs and southern fried chicken (Black students Union), an ice cream booth (CSF), a "write it yourself" newspaper headline booth (Doctrine Staff), an ecology booth which will carry information on ecology and the "Hike for Hunger", raffie off ecology products and sell organic food, and a "Hole in the Wall" booth featuring bagles (with cream cheese or butter) and doughnuts decorated in the

eleventh grade class colors (Eleventh grade Class Council).

Also included will be authentic French, Russian, German and Spanish food also with an occasional line of can-can girls, folkdancing and folksinging (Foreign Language Department), a "Ye Olde Candy Shoppe" with peppermint and lemon drops and caramelled apples (Girls' League), a down home country store which will feature knick-knacks, macrame, candles and ponchos (GAA-Lettergirls), a "Cake Walk" booth with prizes of cakes for winning ring toss and bean bag games (Knights and Ladies), a gambling booth with a wheel of fortune dice and many (non-cash) prizes (Math Club), a Shakespeare Theatre with apple cider, folk-singing and pantomimes (Shakespeare Class), and the annual Marriage booth (Student Council).

Admission is \$1.00 at the door and it includes 50¢ script. Additional tickets will be sold inside.

Cap and gown measurements along with a \$6.00 rental fee are due this week in the Student Store for those seniors who plan to participate in the graduation ceremony.

Mrs. Rood said enthusiastically, "Students learn to use their body to its most exciting limits."

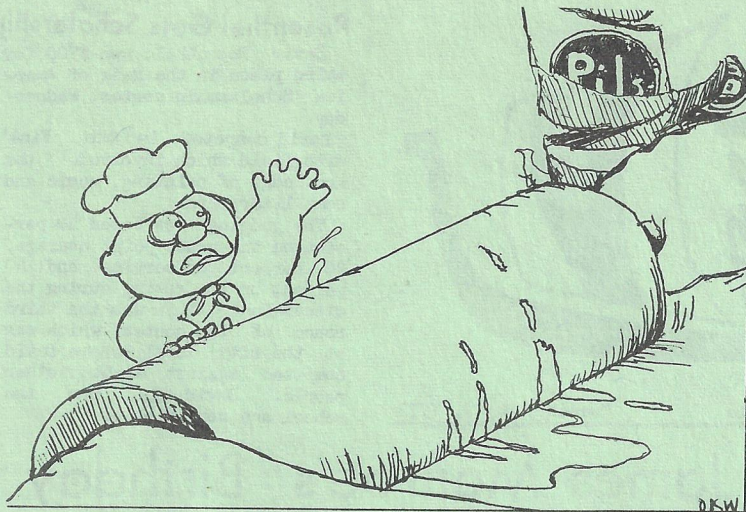
The class will progress into improvisational mime before the end of the semester.
