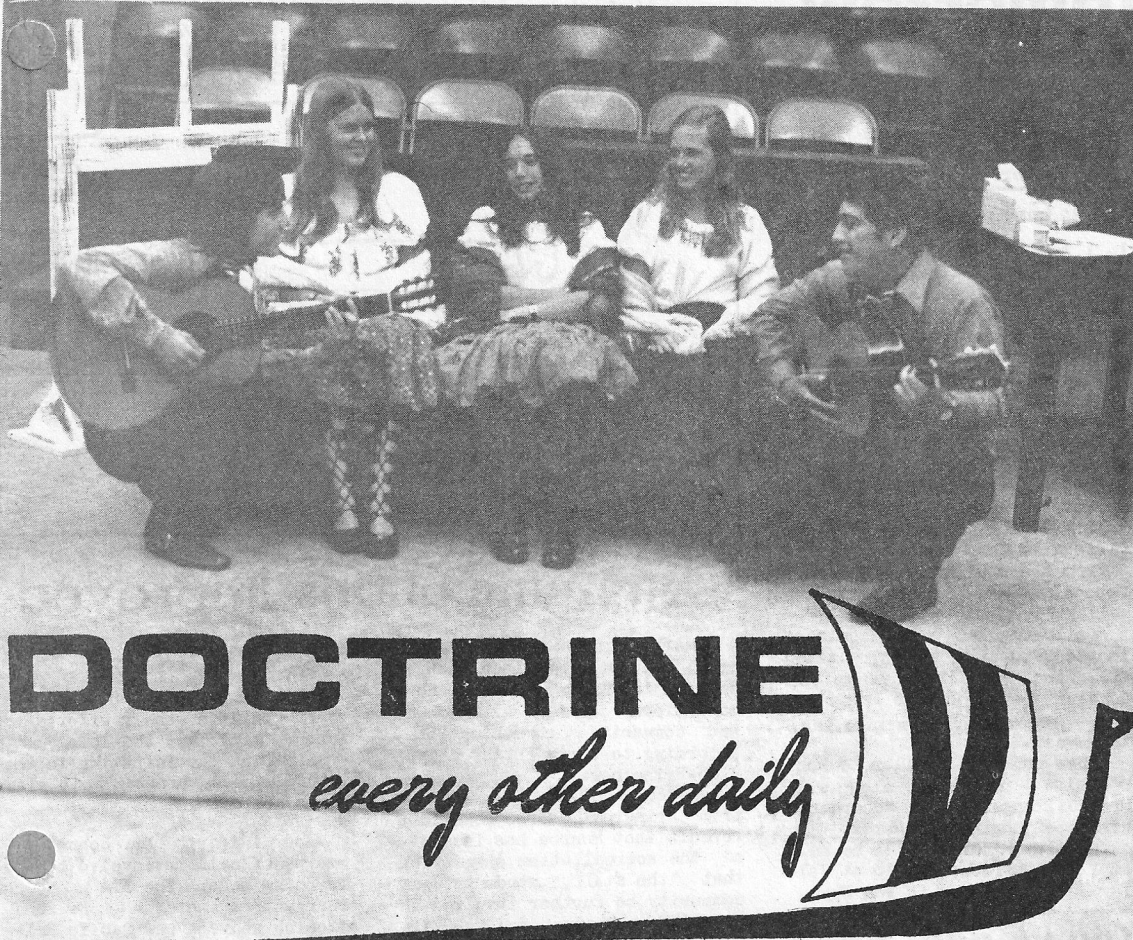


# AFS Celebration Tonight



The annual AFS Carnival will be held tonight in the boys gym to raise funds for AFS finalists Kerry Silvey and Mike Spore and to support any foreign exchange student who might attend Monroe next year.

Admission is \$1.00 and includes 50¢ script. Doors will be open from 6:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. Additional tickets will be sold inside.

A few of the featured booths will be a "soul food" booth, serving chitlins, pig knuckles, barbecued spare ribs and southern fried chicken (Black Students Union), and an ice cream booth (GSF), a "write it yourself" newspaper headline booth (Metrine Staff), an ecology booth which will carry information on ecology and the "Hike for Hunger", raffle off ecology products and sell organic food, and a "Hole in the Wall" booth featuring bagels (with cream cheese or butter) and doughnuts decorated in the eleventh grade class colors (Eleventh grade Class Council).

Also included will be authentic French, Russian, German and Spanish food with an occasional line of can-can girls, folkdancing and folksinging (foreign language department), a "Ye Olde Candy Shoppe" with peppermint and lemon drops and caramelized apples (Girls' League), a "down-home" country store which will feature knick-knacks, macrame, candles and ponchos (GAA-Lettergirls), a cake walk with prizes of cakes for winning ring toss and bean-bag games (Knights and Ladies), a gambling booth with a wheel of fortune, dice and many (non-cash) prizes (Math Club), a Shakespearean theatre with apple cider, folksinging and pantomime (Shakespeare class) and the annual marriage booth (Student Council).

## Decea Nabs Top Spot

Winning a majority of votes cast in elections held yesterday on the Senior Stage at lunch Steve Decea defeated Bill Bolde for the office of Student Body President.

Aiding Steve in the capacity of Vice President will be Gayle Zimmerman, elected over Steve Gellman and Art Rieman.

Other results from yesterday's elections are Bonnie Goodman defeating Mike Waskul for Treasurer, Pam Meyers over Brent Shoji and Ann Surtshin for Commissioner of Assemblies, Linda Varblow over Steve Berke and Donna Schwartz for Commissioner

of Publicity, and Randy Stalk over George Sublette for Commissioner of Elections.

Steve Zipp ran unopposed and will be next year's Commissioner of Campus Beautification. Jan Spector, also unopposed, will serve as Commissioner of Social Activities. Cindy Kaplan, unopposed, will be next year's Assistant Secretary. Susie Shimomaye will function as Corresponding Secretary, Roger Messick as Commissioner of Athletics, David Eisenberg as Commissioner of Service, and Cheryl Shrader as Alumni Secretary. Next year's Yell King will be Tom White.

Steve Decea feels that a permanent visitor section should be established in Student Council with classes formally invited to observe Council's operation. He hopes to arrange monthly meetings between schools to exchange ideas. He also feels that the G-Hall patio and the agriculture area should be open for students lunchtime use and he favors a "see no evil" smoking policy. Steve also hopes to preserve the PA system, set up special classes "to follow up on this summer's quad improvement project," air students' views, and hold a candy drive to buy lights for the tennis courts and other school supplies.

In Monday's special government issue, the DOCTRINE misquoted former Student Body President Brent Hunter as saying, "Student Council is only as effective as the people who run it." Brent really said that Council is only as effective as the people "behind it." He feels that Josh Bottfeld is doing a competent job as president but needs to be somewhat more business-like.

## Communications Improved

A marked improvement and diligent attempt has been made to act on the Accreditation recommendations dealing with school and community communications, according to Larry Foster, Boys' Vice-Principal.

A letter sent to Mr. Foster from Principal George Schneider reveals that Monroe has installed the accreditation suggestion that "the staff, students and community be further involved in sharing experiences and in evaluating the total instructional program." According to the letter, the institution of the Sponsor Room serves as an experience-sharing technique. Also, the mini courses provided a sharing of talent for staff, students and community and the Monroe Community Advisory Council

is active in exchanging ideas.

The recommendation that "the staff continue their efforts to further involve the local community in participating in the total school program" is also being acted on.

According to Mr. Schnee every effort to involve parents is being made. The PTA has been reorganized into a more functioning body, a new Public Relations class has been formed to encourage the community to participate in Monroe's happenings, and a monthly newsletter is being sent home to parents to inform them.

Construction is now under way on the north side of the school along Tupper Street, to replace the ivy with grass and to install new sprinklers and water locks.
