## Hardballers Defeat Eagles

Tabbed as slight favorites to repeat as LA City champions, Monroe's Varsity baseball squad entered 1972 tournament competition in "swinging style" yesterday afternoon as they hammered Eagle Rock, 14-0, at the Sepulveda Sports Center in Encino.

The Vikes will now advance into quarter-final competition on Monday when they'll face Western League champion Venice.

The Gondoliers earned their second round berth yesterday as they edged Bell, 2-1.

It was a slugfest from start to finish for the Mid-Valley League champion Vikings as they pounded out 15 hits in only six innings.

But the game's real hero was junior pitching sensation Russ Johnson who turned in a magnificent two-hit performance while striking out 12 batters.

Johnson, 7-2 in MVL action, is no stranger when it comes to play-off pressure as his 1971 heroics against San Pedro are still vividly remembered.

The Vikes got off to another quick start in the first frame as slugging right fielder Craig Cacek put the Vikes on the scoreboard with a booming two-run homer to center field.

From then on it was all downhill as the Vikes proceeded to nail starting Eagle pitcher Dale Cheney to the mound with six more runs, until he was finally relieved in the fourth inning.

Highlight of the afternoon came in the fifth when the Vikes cushioned their 4-0 lead with five more tallies on three doubles, a single and a walk.

Junior second baseman Bob Slater opened the inning with a double to left and was promptly followed by Bill Barto, who reached base on a free pass. Cacek, who was 3 for 4 at the plate with three RBI's, then rifled the Vikes' second two-bagger down the left field line to score Slater with Barto taking third.

After a pair of ground-outs by Dennis Shaw and Brad Rice, Bruce Rosenblum drove in both Barto and Cacek with the Vikings' third extra base hit of the inning.

Rosenblum scored the Vikes' ninth run of the afternoon on Gerry Grandi's single to center.

## Rules Adopted On Student Expression

Any student or group of students wishing to circulate a petition or any other sort of material on campus must apply for administration approval at least 24 hours in advance in accordance with the recently released Student Rights Handbook, according to Mr. Robert Kindseth, Head Registrar.

The purpose of the application which is available in the main office, is to provide the participating students with a tangible permit to present to campus security agents who may question these students. Mr. Kindseth made it clear that the principal will not censor any material as long as it conforms with the regulations stating that such material cannot "Express racial, ethnic, or religious prejudice or abuse an individual or a group; be obscene or pornographic to minors according to current legal definitions; incite students as to clearly create a danger of disruption. . . or the commission of an unlawful act."

The application for a permit will contain all the rights that a student has in circulating such material and what rights other students have to accept or reject it. Students blocking traffic in halls and other parts of the campus or using any form of force to distribute material would be an infringement of the rights of others and will not be allowed, according to Mr. Kindseth.

Another mini-course, Bicycling, takes place Wednesdays during X-5 in G-4.

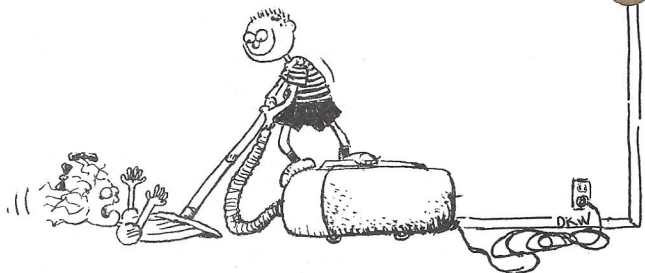

In response to a letter by Doug McBride in the DOCTRINE (May 12), yes, I do very much value my rights to privacy. But let's put this whole thing into its proper perspective. May I ask Doug just what he was doing "sitting in the foreign language office"? The foreign language office is for the use of foreign language teachers and their TA's for department work. All of the equipment, including the telephone, is the property of the Los Angeles City Schools and is the direct responsibility of this department.

Doug was not authorized to use the foreign language office for whatever purpose he states. The student who used the phone for official school business was authorized to do so. In fact, Doug's letter is a direct invasion of official privacy.

Or don't we have the same rights to privacy which he demands? Is that only reserved for those who want the right to

break school rules without possibility for legal enforcement?
