## New Classes Planned 1971-1972 Semester

Several new classes in each of four departments will be offered at Monroe next semester. They will be added to the curriculum if enrollment is sufficient.

The business department will offer three new subjects. Record keeping will be for students in the clerical or sales field. It is a semester course. Notehand-Typing is an annual course with emphasis on taking notes for personal use. It stresses typing term papers, reports, etc. and is recommended particularly for college preparation. Business Economics is a study of the existing American economy based on everyday business principles. Each of these three classes will be offered to 10th, 11th, and 12th graders and require no prerequisite.

Two new foreign language courses will be added to the already existing French, Spanish, German, Russian, and Japanese programs. Hebrew and Italian IAB will be available for 10th through 12th graders with no prerequisite necessary.

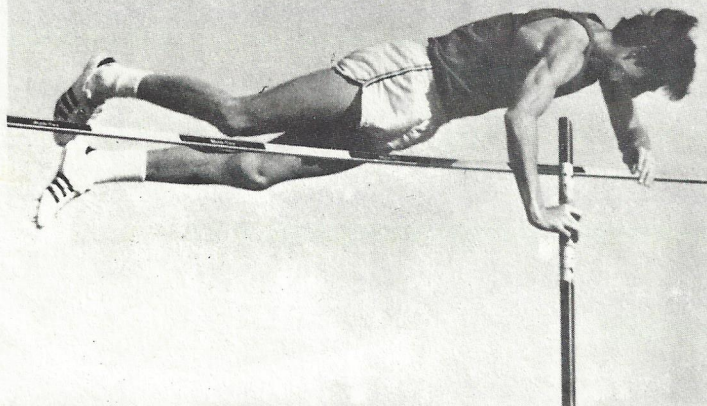
Childhood Education Aide is the newest addition to the Home Economics department. It is an annual course consisting of a double period scheduling to prepare students for employment as aides in day-care centers. There is no prerequisite, but the class is for 12th graders only.

Providing an opportunity to show participation and contributions of minority groups to the United States is American Cultural Minorities, one of the additions to the Social Studies department. Comparative Religions and Law in Modern America will be offered, no prerequisites necessary, to 10th and 11th grade student next semester.
