Students are to fill out their name, subject, class, when they want the class, and their present program only.

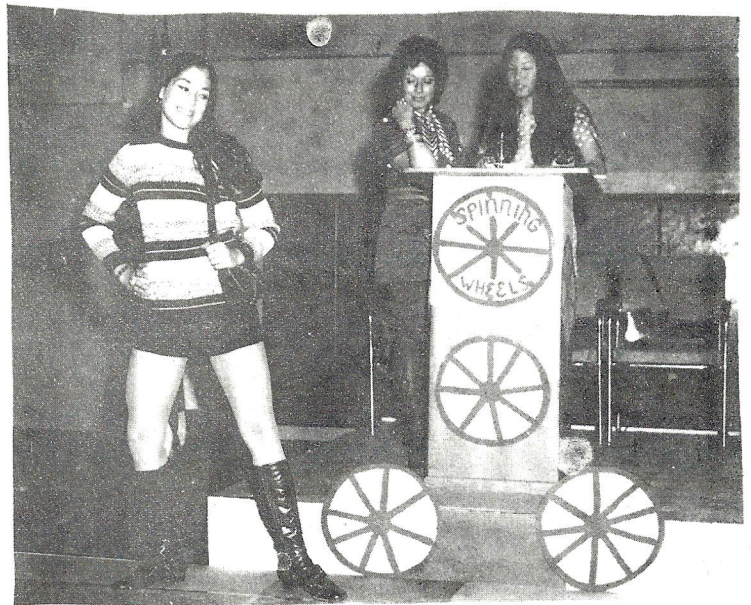
corner it was quite appropriate to finish up the show with three, different evening selections.

The Varsity baseball team travels to Poly today after clobbering Van Nuys 8-1 Tuesday.

Craig Cacek delivered the key blow in that one, a bases-loaded triple, which gave starter Tom Collier all the runs he needed to record in the ballgame and also pitched well for the Vikings.

However, today's game with the Parrots could be the most important game of the season for both teams.

The Vikings are currently sporting a three game lead over the Parrots and Granada Hills, but a loss today would put them only two games up with five left to play.

Meanwhile, if the Parrots lose, they will be four games out of first with only five to play, and will have to struggle to earn a playoff spot in the city championship tournament.

Bob Holt will start for the Vikings today, and coach Osterman of Poly will most likely counter with Bob Ehrig, his ace.

In the last meeting between the two teams, Ehrig was ripped for five runs by an aroused Viking team. If the Parrots hope to win today, their pitching will have to improve.

The big man for the Vikes to stop on offense will be Poly's leftfielder Ed Goldbaum. Goldbaum, who is among the league leaders in batting, is capable

of breaking a close game wide open with his surprising power.

Meanwhile, Craig Cacek continues to be the toughest out for the Vikings. Cacek, only a junior, has been flirting with the .500 mark all year at the plate, and could eventually wind up the league batting champ if San Fernando's Anthony Davis cools off.

So, the stage is set. A loss for the Vikings would put a great deal of pressure on them in the final five games of the season. And if the Parrots lose, there's no tomorrow.

Either way, it should be interesting.

### Traffic Court System Defended by Student

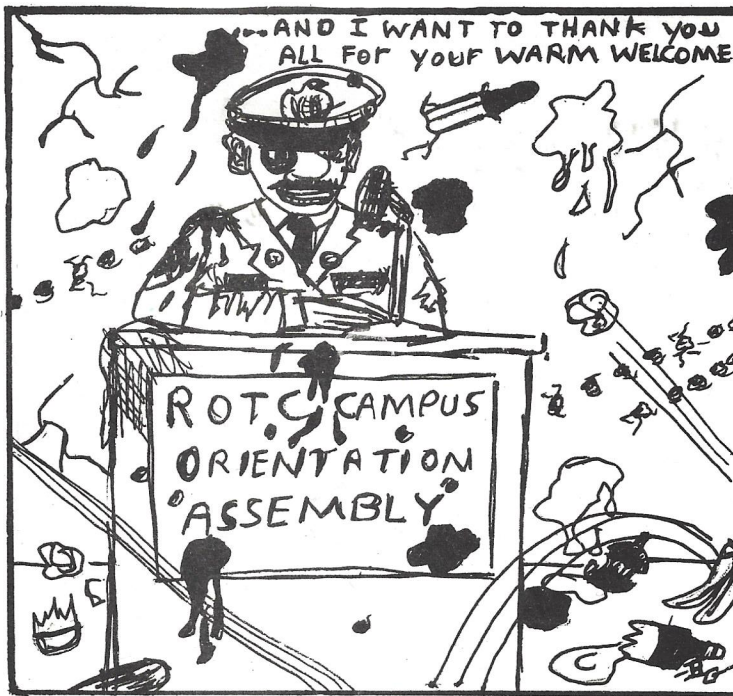

## Golfers Drop 54-18 Verdict to Birmingham

Monroe's Varsity golf team was literally blown off the course in its most recent outing against Birmingham, as they went down to a crushing 54-18 defeat at the hands of the Braves.

Lorin Farr, moved back to third man due to an eye injury, turned in one of his finest performances of the year, as he fired a one over-par 73.

However, the Vikings were completely outclassed by the Braves, whose number eight man shot a 78.

In comparison, Greg Hart of Monroe soared to a 99 in the meet.

The loss took the golf team

out of all possible contention for the league championship, as it was their second defeat of the season. The Linksman will return to action Monday against Poly at Encino golf course.

## \$767 Million Necessary For Schools Next Year

Members of the Board of Education and the public learned that the 1971-2 preliminary budget will require \$767,052,617 to run programs in 624 schools for 738,281 students.

The budget was prepared after months of gathering statistics and requests from the Superintendent's staff and government agencies. It does not contain cost of living salary increases for teachers, full implementation of the new decentralization plan and other improvements. It also does not make any allowances for the restoration of about \$20 million in cuts during 1970-71. Monies for additional improvement would have to come from State sources.

According to Assistant Superintendent Fredrick Fox, numerous pieces of legislation have been introduced in Sacramento which could "ease the financial crises" faced each year by the LA City Schools.

The state, as a source of income provides \$168.3. Local sources furnish \$461.7. Federal sources provide \$11.6, while others furnish \$39.3.

## Evolutionist, Creationist Debate Theories of Mankind's Origin

There are many a theory about how Man came to be, however Darwin's Theory of Evolution and the Theory of Creation seem to be the most widely accepted.

A recent debate at Monroe between Kirk Post, Creationist, and Nick Trierweiler, Evolutionist, seemed to present several facts to discredit each theory.

Trierweiler opened his argument by explaining how the Theory of Evolution was the most logical and most widely accepted theory of how Man came to be.

He went into Darwin's study with greater detail by explaining how he took different fossils and dating them with Carbon 14, thus lining up the earlier specimens up to the more recent species from the time periods.

Nick also went on to point out how during the embryo stage of Man, he resembles a fish. Gills are present and later he moves into the Amphibian stage,

thus pointing out that at one time, we were all similar to a fish.

Trierweilers last point was that the bone structure of Man is the same of that of a horse or a whale except with slight modifications.

Kirk Post opened his argument with saying that the Theory of Evolution was completely invalid. Post went on to tell how Dr. Lewis Moore, noted Paleontologist, conducted an experiment to find out if Darwin's dating methods were valid. Moore placed a drop of Carbon 14 on a LIVING Mollusk, the system dated it at 3,000 years old.

Post also brought out for his final point that Dr. E.A. Houten of Harvard University proved that Man does not go through a fish stage or an amphibian stage and that any theory of the sort is mere fallacy.



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
