Holt Keeps Unbeaten Record; Horsehiders Nip Parrots, 3-1

Bob Holt fired another fantastic ballgame, and his Varsity teammates gave him all the support he needed as the horsehiders won their fourteenth straight Mid Valley League game, 3-1 at the hands of the Poly Parrots.

Already assured of a league championship, the ballgame was only a tuneup for the Vikings, but Poly was in the midst of a battle for second place with Granada Hills, and the Monroe victory may have cost the Parrots their last shot at making the city tournament.

In the final analysis, it was clutch pitching by Holt and some fine defense for the Vikes which made the difference.

Leading 3-1 with one gone and Parrot runners on first and third, Holt induced Poly's Bruce Yamamoto to hit a grounder to second. Rich Reinhardt scooped

up the ball, fired to shortstop Kim Andrew for a force, and the agile senior blazed the ball to first baseman Bruce Rosenblum for the crucial double play.

Aside from that jam, Holt had the game perfectly under control and he improved his MVL record to 7-0 with the victory. Bob, who pitched Jayvee ball last season, could be the Danny Hernandez of 1971 as he has proved to be tough in every game this season.

Skip Willis once again proved his tremendous ability on the basepaths, as he pilfered second and third before scoring on a fly ball to right in the first inning. San Fernando's Anthony Davis has received the headline coverage this season, but Willis has won many a game for the Vikings in centerfield this season.

Jerry McArthur has also played fine ball of late, as he has been on a tear with the bat and

"Abstractions," this year's cleverly planned, skillfully done Dance Production Show which premiered last night is certainly not a performance you find yourself easily distracted or even abstracted from.

All year long there has been strong evidences from other Monroe Productions that the modern dance department has been, pardon the expression, on their toes. Abstractions proves it. Besides quality there is quantity. The many pieces, 22 in all, show a wide variety of modern dance forms, abstract or otherwise, and show off a group of talented and very professionally rehearsed performers, 24 girls in all.

Other outstanding pieces with concluding outstanding performances 12th grade or otherwise were: Sundries, Road Signs, Romiet and Julio, Imprisonment, the Illustrated Man, a freaky little piece, What's next Charlie Brown the Concrete Jungle, and Peter and the Wolf featuring Leonard Bernstein and troupe.

The entire production was directed by Kaye Wagner who with a little help from her friends is responsible for the whole show.

Faculty Senate Move Opposed

By its very nature, Student Council is ineffective at best. It has no real power as such, and the only time it can accomplish anything significant is when the other two major bodies on campus, the Faculty Senate and Administrative Council, are in favor of the change.

In an attempt to overcome this pitiful situation, a few concerned Faculty and Student members attempted to form a type of "Campus Council."

This council would be composed of five students, five faculty members and at least one administrator and its purpose would be to unite these three bodies to further communication and enact legislation that all are in agreement with.

There is already an administration-faculty committee (the ad-fac committee) and we felt that including the students would be a logical extension of this committee.

However, the Faculty Senate saw no such need for the students as they felt the "Campus Council" would be just another

committee, and completely overlooked the vital role it can play in making campus government a much more effective system.

We feel it is hypocritical for the Faculty Senate to profess to be so concerned about students and yet refuse to allow the students to become an active part of determining school policy.

We urge the Faculty Senate to reconsider its decision and therefore allow students the representation in campus affairs that they are entitled to.

We feel that the purpose of such a body was completely misunderstood by the Senate and we ask that they reverse their decision, thereby allowing campus government to truly fulfill its meaning.

Marching Band Performs For Bonds At LA Arena

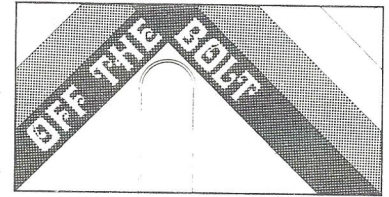
Marching Band, along with the Locke High School Marching Band, performed in the L.A. Sports Arena Wednesday evening to sell earthquake bonds.

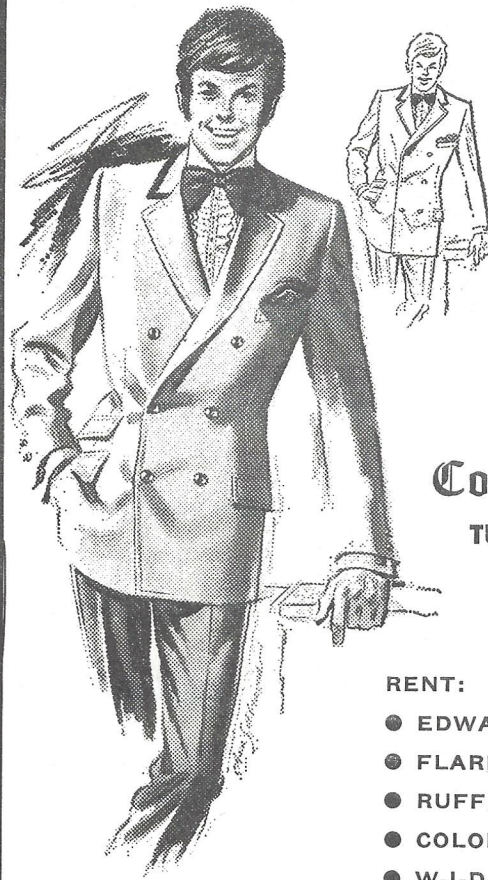
