Tom Collier

Tom Collier rode a blazing fastball and a sharp curve to a 7-0 record this season and a spot on the top ten athletes squad.

The senior righthander was tough all year, and along with Bob Holt, formed part of the toughest 1-2 pitching combination in the city. Collier started the first three games weak outing all season.

Lorin Farr

A tie for the City golf championship boosted Lorin Farr into the top ten athletes. Farr fired a 72 over Wilson to take home a piece of the title.

Farr, who quarterbacked the varsity football team last fall is a senior.

Bob Holt

Courage.

That's what made Bob Holt one of the top ten athletes of the semester.

Although nursing an extremely painful sore arm, Holt tossed 162/3 innings of shutout ball in the City baseball tournament.

A three hit shutout in the City Championship game against Fremont earned Bob the Sid Withers award, which represents the finest single-game performance of the tourney.

Holt's E.R.A. for the league season was 0.92 and the senior righthander walked only five men in 48 innings.

Holt's record was 7-0 on the season.

Brad Horowitz

Brad Horowitz is the finest gymnast to attend Monroe High School.

Despite a fever of 103 degrees, Horowitz managed to finish second in the City all-around championship behind superstar Hector Neff of Taft.

A two-time city parallel/bars champ, Horowitz won four individual mid-valley League titles this season.

John Kolb

John was the utility man for the Viking gymnastics team, and

the blonde senior earned his way into the top ten athletes by taking the city parallel bar championship.

Kolb scored valuable points in the long horse and high bar all season and was instrumental in gaining the city title for Monroe.

Gary Morgan

It was a mediocre season for Gary Morgan. All he did was win the MVL and City championships in the rope climb.

And to top it off, the muscular senior broke the city record of 3.0 seconds with a lightning-fast 2.9 clocking in the city finals.

Skip Willis and Kim Andrew were named to the all-city baseball squad on the first team Monday.

Other Vikings named were Bob Holt on the second squad and Dennis Shaw and Tom Collier were third-team choices.

Tim Quinn

One of the finest accomplishments in Monroe's athletic history came when Tim Quinn won the state pole vault championship this season.

Quinn, only a junior, cleared 15-2 to win the title, the first state crown ever held by a Viking.

The school record of 14'0" was easy money for Tim but the real test came in the state meet.

Under intense pressure, Quinn came through when it counted most, and provided Viking fans with one of the biggest thrills of a very thrilling year.

Skip Willis

Perhaps the finest athlete to ever attend Monroe is Skip Willis.

Willis, who has a Varsity letter in football track, and baseball, sparked the baseball team to its perfect record.

The unnamed captain of the squad, Willis continually delivered with clutch hits and fantastic catches to earn himself a spot in the top ten athletes.

Skip was drafted by the Chicago White Sox last week.

Willis also ran track, and anchored the Viking 4x0 relay team which was never defeated in league competition this season.

Fine performances in the 100 and 220 also marked Willis' 1971 track season. He is truly a super-athlete.

Kurt Zimmerman

A city championship in the side horse was the bases for Kurt's selection to the athletes of the semester.

Zimmerman dedicated himself completely to gymnastics the past three years, and was far and away the finest performer on the side horse in the city this season.

Kurt follows in the steps of Brian Kolb, who won the city side horse title in 1969 for Monroe.

Dan Poston stated that all applications for the office of Commissioner of Elections must be turned in by today. In a special meeting Thursday, Council will vote on a new Commissioner of Elections.

The issue was first brought to Student Council, and then Council's decision was relayed to the administration.

When it was learned that the administration had agreed with the decision, Council immediately went to work on holding an appointive-election to fill this vital office.

Council Passes Rights Bill, Turns Down Student Court

Student Council passed the Bill of Rights but defeated the establishment of a Student Court Monday.

After a short debate, the Bill of Rights was accepted by an overwhelming margin and will now be appearing before the Administration for discussion.

The much debated student court, though, was defeated after many council members complained that students would not be qualified enough to handle the responsibility of judging other students.

As they stand now, the approved rights have no effect until the students have met with the Administration and discussed specific regulations.

Bill of Rights Clarified

Now that everybody has gotten all stirred up about the student bill of rights and everybody wants to do something about it but doesn't know what, let me clarify what it means and what my intentions are.

First of all, the bill of rights has been my concern for quite a while. Originally, it was intended to be a list of the rights which we now enjoy so that if there should be any change in administration, we would not be affected.

But after many hours of investigation I found that we have only a few rights and only to a small degree. These rights, better known as privileges, are found in the first article of my bill of rights and are actually guaranteed.

These rights, or responsibilities, are freedom of speech, press, and religion. The rest of the bill is concerned with search and seizure, a student court, and rights of an accused person.

Since the bill was presented in Valkyrie, I have found that the first time in many years, students have been stirred into action. But this action is not well organized, it has not yet set a plan of attack, and its goal is still not defined between going through the system or going out on their own.

First of all, I intended to put this bill of rights into effect at Monroe. It is unnecessary to go to the Supreme Court or any other place higher than the Board of Education at the present time. That is something to be done later after we can prove to people that this is workable and that we aren't trying to carry out a "Communist Plot".

If we go straight to the top, without preparation, without experience, and without facts, we will fail in what I consider the most important action ever taken

We cannot shoot for the moon without learning to fly. But we have to be strong and accept what we are up against.

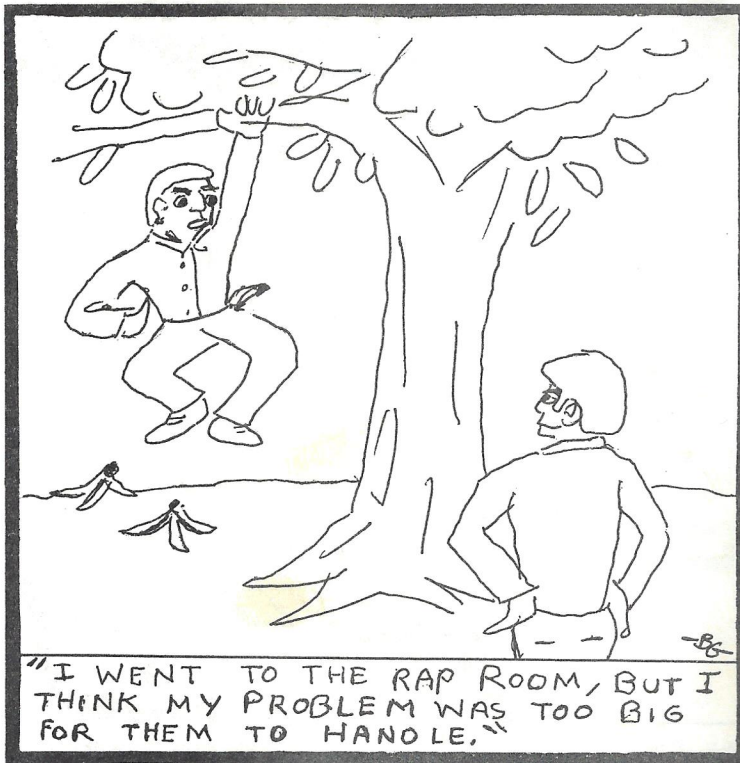
